II. How God uses difficulty to create holiness in our lives.

- A. The revelation of the source of our difficulties.

a. The purpose is to deepen, discipline and to detect areas of weakness that we need to work on. (James 1, II Corinthians 12:5-6, I Peter 6)

b. It is meant to enlighten the believer as to what God wants to do about the problem.

- c. It is meant to empty of us of the attitude that hinders us. (II Corinthians 12:9)
- d. It is meant to enlarge us of God's vision for our lives.
- e. It is meant to enrich us.
- f. It is meant to establish us. (I Peter 5:10)
- 4. The refining process must be daily.

- 6. Rejoicing, this is the right response.
 - a. When a person praises God at the bottom, his heart changes.
 - b. Rejoicing is part of the cure.

 - 2. Partaking in His holiness.
 - 3. Peace.
 - 4. Becoming precious.
