Eternal Security—Does it Really Matter? *Charles Stanley*

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- A. Text: I John 5:13.
- B. Eternal security is the work of God, which He guarantees that the word of salvation once received can never be lost.
- C. This speaks of a quantity of time and a quality of time.
- II. If a person knows he is eternally secure, it will affect many aspects of his life.
 - A. People take away from the work of Christ when they deny eternal security.
 - 1. Salvation is only based upon the work of Jesus, so a person has eternal security. (I John 2)
 - 2. Christ died for all the sins of all mankind but one must receive Christ. (I John 2)
 - 3. If Jesus died for all of our sin, then the debt is entirely taken care of. Repentance after salvation makes fellowship right; it does not restore a person to salvation.
 - 4. Works are not involved in any area of our salvation—if we involve human works in any area of salvation, the work of Christ was not enough. (Ephesians 2, Galatians 2:16)
 - 5. There are many expectations for the life of the believer, but it does not affect a person's salvation.
 - B. Many people cannot witness because they do not feel like they are secure in their salvation.
 - 1. If there is a time limit to salvation, one cannot effectively witness.
 - 2. Without security, we inject works into salvation. (Galatians 2)
 - 3. It is foolish to think that one will give his life over to God on his deathbed.
