I. Introduction.

- A. If one is going to follow the New Testament, discipleship is not an option.
- B. Text: I Thessalonians 1.
- C. It is unclear how long Paul stayed in Thessalonica, but he had a tremendous impact. (Acts 17)

II. One has to learn to share the message of Christ in the power of the Spirit if he is going to have a ministry.

A. Paul shared with God-fearing Jews and Gentiles. We have to have a balanced ministry with regard to the world and the church.

B. Those that have the greatest impact come in personal weakness and divine power. When a person realizes his own inadequacy, God will change hearts. (I Corinthians 2:1-5, 3:6-7, 1:26, II Corinthians 12:9)

III. One needs to have a high quality of life. (I Timothy 4:12)

A. One needs to memorize Scripture.

B. In everything, a person is to be a pattern for others. (Titus 2:7-8, Hebrews 13:7)

- C. One needs to be a model with his family. (I Timothy 2)
- D. We have to work at being an example. (I Peter 4:1, II Thessalonians 3:7-9)

IV. One needs to share his life.

A. This does not mean that people should reproduce themselves—one should lead a person in order to make them followers of Christ. (I Corinthians 11:1, 4:15-17)

B. All throughout the Scriptures Paul was comfortable in exhorting others to follow him. He felt comfortable sending others because he trained them well. (Philippians 4:9, II Thessalonians 3:7-9, I Thessalonians 1)

C. When you begin to share your life, people will respond.
