I. Introduction.

- A. Continuance in the Word.
- B. Love.
- C. Fruit of reproduction. (Galatians 5:22-23, John 15:16, Genesis 1:11)
 - 1. Fruit is the seed of reproduction.
 - 2. When the Lord saved you, He saved a potential soul winner/disciple. (John 12:24)
 - a. Our part is dying to ourselves.
 - b. He died that we might live. We die that He might live. (Galatians 2:20)
 - 3. There is a cost to reproduction. (Luke 9:62, Luke 14:25)
 - a. Jesus did not hate his parents—he prepared a special person to look after His mother.
 - b. Love desires above all else the presence of the beloved object.
 - c. The love that Jesus demands for Himself compared to the family is so great that you could call the love for family hate.
 - d. The cost of following Jesus was the cross—it was an awful death.
 - e. The fruit of reproduction is in the seed, and the seed has to die.

II. Three points on salvation.

- A. The penalty of sin is taken away.
 - 1. The good news is that Jesus died, was buried and rose again. He conquered the enemy at his death.
 - 2. When we become Christians we are born again by the Holy Spirit.
- B. The power of sin is being taken away. (Romans 5:10)
 - 1. We have victory over the power of sin through the indwelling Spirit when we are born again.
 - 2. We cannot have victory over sin, but the Spirit can.

C.	The presence	of sin	will be	taken away.	(Philippians	3:20)

- 1. At Jesus' return, this will finally happen.
- III. The nonbeliever must see a person walking with Christ.
 - A. Concentrate on your own relationship with Christ, then on sharing your life with one other person.
