- A. Text: II Corinthians 12.
- B. God advances us through adversity.
- C. Salvation is not God's big purpose—it is only part of it. His purpose is to glorify Himself through us. (Ephesians 1, John 17)
- D. God's purpose is for something greater than our comfort. God intended for our lives to be God-centered not self-centered.
- II. Much of our religious activity is self-centered activity.
 - A. God sometimes sends adversity in our life in order to get our attention.
 - B. One of the primary purposes of adversity is that God wants to deal with the SELF. (Galatians 2:20)
 - C. The self is crucified with Christ, and Christ lives in a person. (Colossians 1:28)
 - D. The goal is to know Christ in His resurrection power. (Philippians 3:10)
 - E. One must understand that at conversion the old self died and accept the new life that is Christ.
 - F. God sends adversity so that self can be crucified and so that Christ's life can be expressed beautifully.
 - G. We must examine our lives, for God's purpose is holiness.
 - H. The only way to deal with self is the cross—it must die.
