## I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Romans 11:25-29.
- B. God's thoughts are beyond our thoughts. (Isaiah 55:8-9, 2 Samuel 7:19)
- C. The purpose of God in salvation is his own glory. (Psalm 19, Isaiah 43, 1 Corinthians 10:31)
- D. God's glory is his essential attribute. (Acts 6, Isaiah 6, Exodus 33)
- E. God judges that which fails to give him glory. (Romans 1, Acts 12, Ephesians 3:21, Isaiah 43:21)
- F. There are four great qualities of the glory of God.

## II. Sovereignty.

- A. Blindness has happened in part to Israel only until God's purpose has been realized.
- B. God's will is a mystery--something hidden in the past and revealed now. The temporary and partial blindness of the Jews is the mystery. (Romans 16:25, Matthew 5:20, Romans 15:16)
- C. The fullness of the Gentiles (rapture) will bring the salvation of the Jews. The fullness of the Jews will bring the kingdom. (Acts 15; Ezekiel 20; Jeremiah 31:31-34; 32:38)

## III. Integrity.

- A. In saving Israel God shows that he keeps his promises. (Hebrews 10:27, 2 Peter 3)
- B. Israel's salvation is a necessity because God promised it. (Isaiah 27:9, Genesis 15, Numbers 23:19)
