- I. Introduction.
 - A. Christian maturity is the greatest problem in the church today.
 - B. The problem is in our own hearts.
 - C. There is a plan for maturity.
- II. We must yield ourselves as instruments to righteousness. (Romans 6:11)
 - A. An instrument is a tool.
 - B. We are to see ourselves as a heavenly tool or implement. The value of a tool is the control one has over it to use.
- III. We start with people who have been alienated and are enemies of God. (Colossians 1:28)
- IV. If we continue in the faith we must continue to maturity.
 - A. It is a process of going on.
 - B. Paul's ministry was to complete the work of God in the lives of those he ministered to.
- IV. The goal is to present every man mature in Jesus Christ.
 - A. Maturity is growing, which is the normal Christian life.
 - B. Warning in the gospel and teaching in the Scriptures are key to growth.
 - 1. Paul began by warning people that they began as enemies of God.
 - 2. All should be taught the word of God, but it should be related to the house of God.
 - 3. Paul's Bible program was geared toward maturity which involves wisdom not mere knowledge of facts.
 - 4. Paul did not preach a doctrine or an ethic but a person--Jesus Christ.
 - 5. We are instruments of Christ. Instruments have no responsibility.
