- B. Christians should establish goals. (Romans 12:15, 1 Thessalonians 5:15)

- II. The character of love makes it worthy of a goal.
 - A. Love is intrinsically supreme because of its divine qualities. (1 John 4:16)
 - 1. There is erotic love that is self-focused, friendship love that is mutual, and divine love that is altruistic.
 - 2. The divine love is supreme because it is altruistic.
 - B. Divine love is supreme because it is unique.
 - C. Love is supreme because of its enduring qualities.
 - D. Love is supreme because of its eternal qualities. The gifts are limited because they will eventually be terminated.
- III. Love has to be established as a goal by an act of the will.
 - A. Love is something you do whether you feel it or not.
 - B. God does not tell us to like everybody, but He does tell us to love everyone.
 - C. To love is to be concerned with the well being of the object of love despite the object's merits.
- IV. The fruit of the Spirit is love.
 - A. The spark is obedience.
 - B. The fuel is dependence.
- V. Necessary actions.
 - A. We must evaluate our relationships.
 - B. We may need to reconcile being prepared to take initiative and to reject.
 - C. We must be ready to consolidate making sure that we do not get in the mess we did before.
 - D. With existing relationships we must be prepared to fulfill the divine directive.
