I. Introduction.

- A. Looking forward to the return of Christ is purifying meditation. (1 John 3:3)
- B. There are more than twice as many mentions of Christ's Second Coming than His first it is very important, therefore.
- C. History should be called "His-story." In His story, events are moving towards a climax. (1 Corinthians 15:24; 2 Peter 3:3)
- D. God's purpose is expressed: that all human history shall be consummated in Christ. (Ephesians 1)
- E. The climax is yet likely some time away though.
- F. There are two areas of time: eternity past and eternity future.
- G. In Revelation 20 a thousand year period is mentioned five times concerning the end of the age. This is the millennium.

II. Eternity past.

- A. You cannot go earlier than the beginning. (Genesis 1:1)
- B. In the original creation it was perfect in every detail. (Isaiah 45:18)
 - 1. All the stars sang together as they composed a great background symphony. (Job 38)
 - 2. In Genesis 2 the earth does not appear to be in this state.
 - 3. Various views claim that there is a gap between Genesis 1 and Genesis 2.
 - a. In this time existed the creation of Satan who was both beautiful and bright. (Ezekiel 28)
 - b. There was a mineral paradise of Eden described here.
 - c. Isaiah 14 describes the fall of Satan.
 - d. Jeremiah 4:23-26 is an eye-witness account after Satan's rebellion. The earth was without void.
 - e. 2 Peter 2:4 also substantiates the rebellion. 1 Corinthians 6, Jude 6 and Matthew 25:41 do also.
 - 4. God put a new overseer after the events of Satan Adam.

- a. Satan has a great deal of liberty even today. He set out upon a jealous campaign to regain his lost empire.
- b. During this period of time the principle activity seems to be a struggle between Christ and Satan for the souls of man. (1 Corinthians 4:9)
- III. An undetermined period between Genesis one and the flood.
 - A. Bishop Usher thought this was about 1600 years, but many disagree with him.
 - B. There is little information about this period.
 - C. Conditions of the earth: Adam did not eat meat. Water came not from the sky but from the ground. Lifespan was long. Climate was perfect.
 - 1. Differing theories on the temperature have to do with earth tilt, land/water temperature, and the canopy theory that presumes the earth was covered with a canopy of water.
 - 2. Theories also exist about a united landmass that all people inhabited.
 - D. Man was judged under the flood.
 - 1. Water burst forth from the ground. (Genesis 7:11)
 - 2. The flood was a giant mud pie that churned up the world, creating all sorts of land formations.
 - E. Noah ignorantly became drunk because the grape juice he expected experienced something new under the canopy-less sky that fermented the grape juice through the sun's power. Man's life was shortened and his diet changed.
