 - 1. Whereas the worth of the individual is absolute, this is relative.
 - 2. It is conditioned upon yielded-ness.
 - 3. Man was meant to be a channel of blessing to the whole creation from the beginning. (Genesis 1:28, Romans 8, Genesis 12)

 - b. Our attitudes towards people can often restrict people. People do not have fixed potential. Even Jacob was changed.
 - c. We ought to trust God for people. This is one of the greatest acts of faith.
 - d. Everyone of us has an immense need to be trusted.
 - e. We must really get to know people beyond the externals.
