  - A. 1 Corinthians 15:55 sums up this book.
    - 1. The ultimate test of a soldier is not only how he lives but how he dies.
    - 2. How does your faith look at the time of death?
    - 3. A key test for other religions is to find out what the view of death is.
  - B. The authority behind the charge is the authority of heaven and earth.
    - 1. Timothy must respond to the need of the hour because of this authority.
    - 2. Timothy must respond also because he would be judged. (2 Corinthians 5:10-11)
    - 3. The authority is the living presence and reality of Christ.
  - C. The contents of the charge.
    - 1. Preach the Word.
      - a. It is the lion. Let it loose. You do not need to defend it.
      - b. It should be the heart of what you are sharing.
      - c. The Word breaks the hard hearts of people for the glory of Christ. (Jeremiah 23:29)
    - 2. Be urgent when in all seasons whether it is inconvenient or convenient.
      - a. Seldom is there an ideal season.

- b. Do not look for fair weather to do your evangelism. (Ecclesiastes 7:4)
- 3. Rebuke.
  - a. There is a difference between contending for the faith and being contentious for the faith.
  - b. Contending must be done in love. (Ephesians 4:15)
- 4. Never lose patience.
  - a. Patience comes in trials.
  - b. It is a matter of plodding over talent.

  - 1. People will reject sound truth.
  - 2. People will choose what they want to hear and whom they want to hear it from.
  - 3. People will stumble into manmade fictions.

  - 3. We are to evangelize and make progress in the ministry regardless of our gifts.
