 - A. The assumption is that there is already motivation for Scripture memory.
 - B. A lot of Scripture tells us we should memorize Scripture. (Psalm 119:105, 119:130)
 - C. Jesus going away made it possible for us to make a commitment because of the Holy Spirit whom He sent.
 - D. We are born again and the Spirit within us needs to be fed with the Word of God. (Deuteronomy 6:6, 11:18-19, Proverbs 6:20-23, Colossians 3:16)
 - E. Present thoughts determine present action, so memorize the Word. (John 8:32, 2 Peter 1:4, John 14:26, Psalm 119:111, 119:155, Joshua 1:8, Proverbs 2:1, 2:4-5)
 - F. The speaker was influenced by Navigators in the military to memorize Scripture.
- III. If you want to memorize Scripture, you have to have a system like "Beginning with Christ."
 - A. Have someone memorize Scripture with you.
 - B. You have to have tenacity. (John 16:24)
 - C. Use repetition.
- IV. Question and Answer.
 - A. Set yourself a pace. Do not try to memorize chapters it is too much to retain.
 - B. Keep a pack with you to review all the time.
 - C. The speaker memorizes verses by book as opposed to topics to systematically cover them. (Isaiah 1:18, 1:19, 2:11-12, 5:20-21, 8:20, 9:6, 11:3, 11:9, 14:12-14, 26:3, 28:9-10, 28:17, 30:15, 30:18, Mark 8:36, Mark 10:45, Luke 6:26, Luke 9:23, Luke 12:15)
 - D. We can look forward to victory with Scripture memory. (Job 31:1)
 - E. Use cards for accessibility in Scripture memory.
