Laws of the Harvest

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- I. Introduction.
- II. We reap what we sew. (Galatians 6:7-8)
 - A. We must be careful about what we think about because one day the things on our heart will come out.
 - B. If you have a problem with lust, anger or greed, sooner or later you will reap what you sew. (Psalm 9:17)
 - C. We are not to ask only for problems to go away, but for strength to endure them.
- III. We reap the same kind as we sew. (Job 4:8)
 - A. All wrongs will not simply be all right.
 - B. The reason that David could say goodness could follow him was because the Lord was his Shepherd.
- IV. We reap in a different season than we sew.
 - A. You have as much time as you need. (Proverbs 30:20)
 - B. We store up time in education, money, strength and experience. (Psalm 27:14, Isaiah 30:18, Isaiah 40:31, Habakkuk 2:3, Isaiah 64:4)
 - C. Whatever you need, wait on the Lord.
- V. We reap more than we sew.
 - A. Live within your means regardless.
 - B. David's murder for lust brought about heavy consequences on his family. (Deuteronomy 17:17)
- VI. We reap in proportion to what we sew. (2 Corinthians 9:6-7)
 - A. Pass on what you do not want or need anymore.
- VII. We reap through perseverance. (Ecclesiastes 10:18, Proverbs 23:21)
 - A. You have to learn to live by your mind when your body is tired.
 - B. Perseverance reaps positive consequences later in life.
- VIII. We cannot do anything about last year's harvest, but we can about this year's harvest. (Joshua 7:10)
