- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Genesis 9:18-28.
 - B. There is really only one race, but there are three families of mankind.
- II. Things of interest.
 - A. The drunkenness of Noah.
 - 1. There is no condemnation here even though everywhere afterward this act is condemned.
 - 2. Noah lay naked in his tent after this happened.
 - B. The strange act of Ham.
 - 1. It is unclear what happened here exactly.
 - 2. Some say that "seeing Noah's nakedness" is euphemistic for some homosexual act. (Deuteronomy 18)
 - 3. Shem, Ham and Japheth all lived in a culture of sexual perversion before the flood.
 - C. The filial respect of Japheth and Shem. They showed love and honored their father.
 - D. The curse of Ham's grandson Canaan.
 - 1. Noah cursed Canaan instead of Ham because sexual perversion is linked with parental influence.
 - 2. There may even be a direct hereditary link to homosexuality. (Genesis 6)
 - 3. These tribes became such a perversion upon the land that they needed to be wiped out in order to preserve society from the deterioration and degradation that society represented. (Joshua 9:23)
 - 4. The curse was fulfilled in Joshua's day.
 - 5. The colored people of the earth are descendents of Ham, but not all his descendents were through Canaan.
 - E. The descendents of Shem were given a role of spiritual leadership—Judaism, Christianity, and Islam descend from this line.

 - 1. Canaan was given to slavery.
 - 2. The rest of Ham's descendents were given to technical service.
 - 3. They were the great inventors.

- G. Man has the capacity to think, create and worship—all these need to be held into balance. (Psalm 8)
