- C. The Tabernacle gives the pattern of man--the Tabernacle was built to be the house of God and we are that dwelling of God.

II. The functions of the tabernacle.

- A. The outer court, which corresponds to the body of man since it puts us in touch with the outer world.
- B. The Holy Place, which corresponds to the soul.
 - 1. The golden candlestick, which signifies truth produced by the Holy Spirit.
 - a. We need truth given to us by the Holy Spirit to live properly.
 - b. The basis of our operation should be to see things as they really are.
 - 2. The table of showbread.
 - a. The loaves are a picture of humanity and the fine flower is a picture of redeemed humanity.
 - b. The people of God need to have fellowship with one another and God in their midst--this is what the showbread points to.
 - c. The church ought to learn to love each other and listen to each other.
 - 3. The golden altar of incense.
 - a. Frankincense had to be burned because it yields its fragrance only when it is burned--it is a picture of what is yielded through suffering.
 - b. This pictures the will and the necessity of the will in the life of God.
 - c. A broken spirit and a contrite heart is what honors God.
- C. The Holy of Holies, which corresponds to the spirit.
