- II. The parable of the sewer.
  - A. There are five symbols that are used.
    - 1. The sewer. This is the Lord Himself.
    - 2. The field.
    - 3. The seed.
      - a. This is the fantastic message the Lord sewed.
      - b. The mustard seed is used here, which is irritating and biting.
      - c. The message of the kingdom of God is intended to stir people up.
      - d. The mustard seed is also used to symbolize smallness.
      - e. The gospel is thought to be small by the world.
    - 4. The tree.
      - a. It would not be expected for a mustard seed to produce a tree.
      - b. A tree always stands for authority, power, and dominion.
      - c. It is not about the church—the focus is due the Lord.
    - 5. The birds. These are evil ideas that have made residence in God's tree.
  - B. What we must do.
    - 1. We must maintain the pungency of the mustard seed.
    - 2. We must maintain a low profile, not self-aggrandizing ourselves.
    - 3. One day God will cast out the unnatural growth among us.
