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- I. Introduction.
  - A. Text: Mark 1:1-8.
  - B. The Gospel of Mark may be the very first New Testament writing.
  - C. Mark traveled with Paul and Barnabus but left one of the journeys causing Paul to refuse him on another.
  - D. Mark became a close companion of Peter's.
  - E. It is possible that Mark shows up in his Gospel when Jesus was seized during the Garden scene—soldiers attempted to seize this person, but they only got a hold of his robe and the unnamed person fled.
- II. Jesus is both human and the Son of God in Mark's Gospel.
  - A. Jesus is the servant who rules. (Mark 1:1-8:26)
  - B. Jesus is the ruler who serves. (Mark 8:27-16)
- III. The beginning of the Gospel is the ministry of John the Baptist.
  - A. There is no reason why men would come to the dessert to hear about sin and repentance.
  - B. However, John spoke to a universal need—a "sin-drome."
    - 1. Sin, which is self-centeredness.
    - 2. Fear.
    - 3. Guilt.
- IV. The promise John announced.
  - A. It was anticipated by the prophets. (Malachi)
  - B. It was to be presented in the wilderness by John according to the promise.
  - C. It was the way to God.
    - 1. The way to God came through the forgiveness of sins.
    - 2. It must begin with the one offended.
    - 3. The offender must admit wrong—repentance is the place where God meets man.
