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- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Mark 1:40-2:12.
 - B. Jesus displays a perceptive understanding of the nature of humanity. (John 2)
- II. The healing of the leper.
 - A. The appeal of the leper to the will of Jesus and Jesus' compassionate response are unique to this parable.
 - B. Sometimes God wills us to be sick given the circumstances we are in and the fallen nature of humanity.
 - 1. For instance, God would not remove Paul's thorn in the flesh.
 - 2. Leprosy is a picture of the sin of man—in Jesus, there was one who could clean the sin of man.
 - 3. Jesus' cleansing of the man was a fulfillment of a sign of the Messiah.
- III. The healing of the paralytic.
 - A. Jesus was there preaching the Word—He was not there for a healing service.
 - B. However, God is always open to the needs of people. (Matthew 11)
 - C. Quality of faith.
 - 1. These men dared to do the difficult.
 - 2. They dared to do the unorthodox.
 - 3. They dared to do the costly.
 - D. The man was paralyzed because of sin, so Jesus goes to the heart of the matter and forgives his sin.
 - E. Jesus used the gift of discernment to tell people what they were thinking.
 - 1. The people were amazed at the healing but also at Jesus' understanding of humanity.
 - 2. They were amazed that someone could understand that a sickness was the result of a sin.
