- I. Introduction.
  - A. Text: Mark 4:1-33.
  - B. Jesus was not primarily interested in healing bodies—He wanted to preach and teach them spiritual truths.
- II. Why Jesus turned to parables.
  - A. One class of hearers has been given the secrets of God (the disciples).
    - 1. Mysteries are those things that are secret to most people.
    - 2. Paul considered Christians stewards of the mysteries of God.
    - 3. The mysteries are inside information on life—there are certain pieces to the puzzle that only God can reveal. (I Corinthians 1)
    - 5. There is the secret of lawlessness and the secret of godliness that is its counterpart—God reveals the key to handle everything that comes.
    - 6. The mystery of the kingdom is how God functions in human society.
  - B. Those outside are those who are not disciples.
    - 1. The truth is hidden to them.
    - 2. The parables will not mean anything to them.
    - 3. The reason is so that they may not understand according to Isaiah. Jesus is speaking about the fulfillment of a prophesy here.
    - 4. The people did not want to be healed spiritually.
- III. Three principles of interpretation for parables.
  - A. Hiding truth a little bit makes it easier to see.
    - 1. Men could never see the grace and glory of God unless it was hidden in a parable.
    - 2. Parables are ways of putting truth that a person will not forget.
  - B. Searching will discover more than expected.
  - C. If you do not use what you have, you will lose it.
