I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Mark 16:1-8.
- B. The end of Mark begins with the darkest day in human history, but it ends with exploding hope.
- C. The women at the grave were caught up in a moment of ecstasy.
- II. What made the women change like this.
 - A. The Saturday before the Resurrection must have been the darkest of days for the disciples.
 - B. However, the disciples' hope had swallowed up their despair—they largely pass over the day in their accounts.

C. Events.

- 1. The stone had been rolled away.
- 2. The tomb was empty.
- 3. The grave clothes remained as if the body had evaporated.
- 4. The angels declared that Jesus had risen from the dead. His identity is stated.
- 5. The angels said that He was not there. His resurrection was physical.
- 6. The angels foretold that Jesus would go ahead.
- 7. The angels commanded the women to tell the disciples and Peter.
 - a. The addition of Peter is a gentle touch.
 - b. Peter is brought again into the apostolic band.
 - c. Jesus is available to individuals.
- 8. The angels tell them that Jesus would go to Galilee as He told them formerly. Jesus' words are trustworthy.
- D. Men believed although they did not see.
 - 1. Jesus makes this point clear to Thomas the doubter.

- 2. This is where we are today—we are blessed because we believe even though we do not see.
- E. We must learn to worship the risen Lord—this is what makes Christianity what Christianity is.
 - 1. Jesus is alive and available to us.
 - 2. Jesus' promise is that if anyone would receive Him, He will enter into a person and change him.
