## For Those Who Thirst Ray Stedman

- I. Introduction.
  - A. Text: John 7:25-52.
  - B. The people disagreed with Jesus' Messianic claims.
- II. Jesus told the Jewish leaders that they did not know God.
  - A. Jesus intention was not to stir up the people.
  - B. Two reactions to Jesus preaching.
    - 1. They reject Him choosing to go on as they were.
    - 2. They believe in Him.
  - C. Jesus came to bring division. (Luke 12)
- III. Jesus clearly perceived that it was not the time for His crucifixion—He was aware of the unseen protecting hand of God.
  - A. If we are walking in the strength of God we know that nothing can happen to us.
  - B. If something happens to us, we know that this is the timing of God.
- IV. The process by which God will fulfill Jesus' departure.
- V. Jesus confirms that He is the spiritual rock from which we drink. (I Corinthians 10)
  - A. If anyone has any thirst, it can be satisfied in Jesus.
  - B. Thirst cannot be left unsatisfied.
  - C. The sign of the Spirit is that you help someone else—in this, your own thirst is quenched.
- VI. Results of Jesus' words.
  - A. Increased division between believers and unbelievers.
  - B. An impotence among Jesus' enemies to be effective against Him.
  - C. The bitter hatred of Jesus' enemies.
- VII. The promise of Jesus is that your thirsts will be met.
