## The One Commandment Ray Stedman

- I. Introduction.
  - A. Text: John 13:18-38.
  - B. We often give simplistic answers to the world's problems.
- II. Jesus was glorified when Judas left—His purpose was being fulfilled—and the Father was being glorified through the cross.
  - A. Jesus addresses the disciples affectionately as little children.
  - B. He tells them that this is the time of His departure marking the time for last instructions.
  - C. The command was to love one another as Christ loved them.
- III. The command to love one another seems simple, but it is exactly what the world needs to solve its problems.
  - A. There is a dramatic secret here: we love as Jesus loved.
  - B. The cause is Jesus' love. The effect is that the believer's love will be like Jesus' love.
    - 1. This love is without respect for persons.
    - 2. It is expressed in deeds and not just words.
    - 3. It is a love without end.
- IV. Why some who call themselves Christians do not always manifest this kind of love.
  - A. The reason that Judas did not manifest this kind of love is because he did not truly receive the Lord.
    - 1. The disciples were shaken because they could not believe that Judas would betray them.
    - 2. One of the greatest signs of spiritual health among the disciples was that they were willing to ask if they would be the one who would betray Him.
    - 3. When aid from Christ is refused, a person's condition has become desperate.
  - B. Peter expressed desire to go with Jesus.
    - 1. Peter could not follow Jesus at that time because his love was the wrong kind of love.
    - 2. Our natural affection is not good enough.

3. Our love must originate from Jesus to be true.
