 - B. Jesus is the only way--in coming to Jesus, Thomas had not realized how much he had come to realize God.
 - C. When one knows Jesus, he knows the Father.
 - D. The greatest secret God wants us to know is the secret of God and man working together.
 - E. Faith is the answer to fear that plagues us.
 - F. The one who believes in Jesus will do the works He does.
 - 1. This does not refer to miracles because there are no greater miracles in the physical realm than what Jesus already did.
 - 2. This must be greater in a spiritual dimension, and the record of Scripture attests to this with the conversion of many souls.
