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- I. Introduction. Text: John 13:1-20.
- II. Despite it being the end of His life during the foot washing, Jesus is still teaching His disciples.
 - A. Jesus' foot washing was a demonstration of His great love.
 - B. Jesus understood that when the time had come, He would make His exodus from the earth. (John 12)
- III. The actions of Judas show that Jesus reveals things exactly the way that they are.
- IV. The foot washing itself.
 - A. Jesus is dramatizing what He intended to do.
 - 1. He arose from the table as He arose from the dead.
 - 2. He laid aside His garments as He laid aside the glory of His deity.
 - 3. He girded Himself as a servant.
 - 4. He poured water into a basin as He would pour out His blood.
 - 5. He washed the disciples' feet symbolizing the act of cleansing human lives with His blood.
 - 6. He resumed His place after the work as He sat down by the Father after redemption had been completed.
 - B. Peter refuses to be washed by Jesus, which is a picture of the sinful pride of human beings who reject the cleansing of Jesus.
 - 1. In our pride, we do not want to admit that we are in need of anything.
 - 2. The gospel requires that we stand low in humility—in this place, we have nothing to offer ourselves.
 - C. A person is justified by faith—Christ cleanses the sin of the entire life.
 - 1. As one walks through life there will be defilement accumulated on the feet.
 - 2. We need regular cleansing by Jesus for daily defilement.
 - D. The disciples ought to wash one another's feet. Forgiveness is critical in this.
