	Introduction

- A. Text: Acts 1:14-2:4.
- B. Many say the church is irrelevant today
- II. The church is the most important body of any age.
 - A. It is the source and support of all realistic knowledge of earth.
 - B. The church is the body of Christ.
 - 1. It is like a living organism.
 - 2. It has the life of Jesus Christ.
 - C. The church is like a building. (Acts 2)
 - D. Both a building and a body are inhabited by a Person—this explains the central relationship of the church.
- III. The foundation for the building.
 - A. The apostles discovered through the Scriptures that Judas had to be replaced among the original Twelve. (Psalm 69)
 - B. Qualifications: the person had to have been there the entire time and he had to witness the Lord's resurrection appearance.
 - C. Our faith is based upon fact, not legend.
 - D. The men cast lots to decide between two things being equal. (Proverbs 16:33)
 - E. Matthias was chosen as Judas's replacement.
 - F. The tasks of the apostles.
 - 1. Pioneer.
 - 2. Proclaim.
 - 3. Pattern.
- IV. The birth of the body.
 - A. It was on the Day of Pentecost.

- 1. Two loaves were to be baked.
- 2. They were symbols of the two bodies that the church was to be formed from the Jews and the Gentiles.
- 3. The loaves were baked with leaven symbolizing sin—the church is not perfect.
- B. On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came.
 - 1. He took 120 isolated individuals and made one out of them.
 - 2. The baptism of the Holy Spirit was a demonstration that they were one. (I Corinthians 12)
- C. Symbols characterizing what the body was supposed to be.
 - 1. Wind. This was a symbol of invisible power.
 - 2. Fire. This was a symbol of purification and passion.
 - 3. Tongues. This was a symbol of edifying proclamation.
