 - 1. This is a great fact, which our faith in God rests on.
 - 2. We are to act upon the fact.
 - 3. We must rest upon the mighty indwelling power of Jesus Christ within us.
- II. Problems of walking in the Spirit.
 - A. Part time victory.
 - 1. One must change because if there is no change there is a serious doubt whether one has become a Christian at all.
 - 2. Should we sin even once after conversion?

 - B. The permissibility of occasional sin.
 - 1. The problem is incomplete acceptance of the death of the old life in the believer.
 - 2. This is an attempt at a part time victory, which is part time failure.
 - 3. We cannot ask for permission with some things and strength against others.
 - 4. Man is made to be mastered by something—we need a cause.
 - a. Everything we do relate to either Christ or self.
 - b. For so long we only were able to love ourselves.
 - c. Obedience to any of it puts you under the power of all of it.
 - 5. You choose Christ in your struggles, and He gets more of a grip on you.
 - 6. One must simply choose his master.
 - C. The end of sin is death—if a man sows death, he will get death.
