  - A. The Spirit helps us in prayer.
  - B. Prayer is the central expression of dependence upon God.
  - C. God is present to do what we need through us.
  - D. We do not know what to pray, so God gives us a thirst after righteousness and for more of Him from the Spirit.
- IV. God's providential work.
  - A. As a result of prayer, we see God's providence.
    - 1. All things work together for those who love God and are called according to His purpose. (Romans 8:28)
    - 2. Everything that happens is God's way of meeting the cry of the Spirit within to lead you into a deeper and more wonderful experience of God's person and glory.
    - 3. God is working situations, not to provide our wants, but our needs for something more.
  - B. God is working out situations that we might become conformed to Jesus Christ. We are all to be like Christ, but every Christian is a varying expression of Him.
  - C. Christians are more than conquerors in Christ because they take the very things designed to destroy them and use them as stepping-stones.
