 - A. Adam pictured and contrasts Christ.

1. Adam brought a single experience of death to all men, but Christ brought a repeated experience of life to all men.

2. Christ died once and brought justification for all despite thousands of trespasses, while Adam died once bringing death to all. One cannot out-sin the grace of God.

3. Death reigns because of Adam's sin taking away vitality and power, but Christ gives life in the midst of death now.
