- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: I Corinthians 1:10-19.
 - B. The Apostle Paul is very concerned with incipient divisions within the church. (Philippians 2)
- II. Unity in the church.
 - A. The ground of unity is the church's relationship to Christ.
 - B. The nature of the unity is the same mind and the same judgment.
 - 1. This does not mean to think alike.
 - 2. This refers to having the mind of Christ—a willingness to give up rights and personal privileges and take a lower place. (Philippians 2)
- III. Schisms in the church.
 - A. Loyalties were divided in Corinth.
 - 1. There were loyalists tied to Paul.
 - 2. There were people in love with oratory tying themselves to Apollos.
 - 3. There were those going back to the roots by tying themselves to Peter.
 - 4. There were others putting themselves haughtily in line with Christ.
 - B. When you divide among men, it is terrible for the church.
 - C. The problem.
 - 1. Christ cannot be parceled up—no one is able to give a complete view of Christ warranting that viewpoint.
 - 2. Men cannot be deified. There is no man that can do what Christ has done.
 - 3. The tendency among groupies is to distort the meaning of symbol—they take a teaching tool and make it into a badge.
- IV. The cure to divisions is the facts of the gospel—particularly, the word of the cross.
