- A. Text: I Corinthians 7.
- B. Guide: vv26-35: three advantages of singleness, vv36-40: pressures of single life.
- C. An explanatory note: Paul says he does not speak as a command from the Lord, but he suggests that he is given this as a subject to be spoken from apostolic guidance.
- II. Advantages of the single life.
 - A. The last days that the church is always living in are perilous and difficult for marriage—singleness has more advantage because of flexibility and mobility.
 - 1. However, it is not a sin to marry.
 - 2. Marriage increases responsibilities.
 - B. You ought to face life differently as a Christian than a non-Christian—it is easier to do this single.
 - 1. This life is passing away. (I John)
 - 2. We are being called to do the will of God.
 - 3. It is easier to do this if one remains single.
 - C. The single man is freer from anxieties.
- III. The pressures of single life.
 - A. Sexual pressure. Paul learned the significance of meaning as coming from the Lord to deal adequately with this.
 - B. Emotional pressure.
 - C. Married life is good, proper and right, but so is single life.
