II. How to give.

- A. Giving is one way to abound in the work of the Lord.
- B. Two reasons why the church in Jerusalem was having trouble.
 - 1. Circumstances: a series of famines.
 - 2. Consequences: their failure to obey what the Lord had said.
 - a. A persecution drove the church out.
 - b. The church lost its wealth as a result.
- C. The Gentile churches were exhorted to meet the need.
- D. Principles of giving.
 - 1. Giving is a universal practice.
 - 2. Giving is to be done weekly.
 - 3. Give freely out of necessity of our Christian relationship.
 - 4. Put something aside and store it up.
 - 5. Give according to the way God has given to you—if God has richly blessed you, increase the percentage of your giving.
 - a. Tithing is not taught in the New Testament.
 - b. Proportionate giving is taught.
 - 6. Give out of willingness and not extortion.
 - 7. Giving should be responsibly carried out.
- III. How to plan and schedule.
 - A. Immediate goals should be short-range goals.

- B. Commitments should be flexible because the Lord can change plans.
- C. Expect provision from God along the way.
- D. Take into account natural events.
- E. There has to be a wide door for ministry but the presence of adversaries.
 - 1. A door without adversaries could make one prideful.
 - 2. A door with too many adversaries could prevent ministry.
