When You are Misunderstood

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- I. Introduction. Text: I Corinthians 2:12-2:4.
- II. Steps to clearing up misunderstanding.
 - A. One must make sure he has a clear conscience first.
 - B. One must try to clear up the misunderstanding so that believers can have a kind of mutual pride in each other.
 - 1. Misunderstandings usually do not disappear by themselves.
 - 2. Christians must not let things lie unsettled. (Matthew 18)
 - 3. Some were upset that Paul had a change of plans and Paul agrees that the Christian should not be fickle with his plans even though he was not guilty.
- III. If the Christian says yes, he should intend to fulfill it.
 - A. A yes and no statement are contrary to the nature of God and therefore should be contrary to the Christian.
 - B. The promises of God are a sure yes--He does not come to reject but to restore.
 - C. The believer begins to experience God's promises when he says yes to God.
- IV. The Spirit of God makes a promise alive to us then helps us to obey.
- V. The Spirit of God helped change his plans.
 - A. He did not come because he wanted to spare them--he wanted to preserve their freedom to act only as the Lord wanted them to act and not only as Paul wanted them to act.
 - 1. Paul demonstrates the importance of spiritual leadership.
 - 2. He wanted the church to exercise the freedom they had in Christ.
 - 3. It is a widespread misconception that leaders in the church are bosses--they are not. (I Peter 5)
 - 4. God is able to transform people into servants that are satisfactory.
 - B. The Spirit led Paul to see that he had already caused enough pain and that visiting would only add more.

Application questions:

1. What are the steps to clearing up a misunderstanding? Why are these important?
2. When have you been hurt by someone who was fickle with their commitment? How does following through with answers make for a positive Christian witness?
3. What was so remarkable about Paul's leadership in contrast to the world's leadership? Do yo see this often in the church today? Explain.
