- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: II Corinthians 2:12-3:6.
 - B. Paul was unable to take advantage of an opportunity for the gospel because he was so troubled.
- II. Paul declares Christ to be his sufficiency despite his despair.
 - A. Christ always leads in triumph.
 - 1. This was like a ticker-tape parade in celebration.
 - 2. Paul juxtaposes this remarkably with his despair.
 - B. Believers are a fragrance of Christ.
 - 1. A fragrance was spread in a Roman celebratory parades that was a fragrance of victory for the winners and a fragrance of death for the vanquished.
 - 2. Wherever Paul went, God could smell the sweetness and beauty of Christ over what he was doing.
 - 3. Paul's work was also a fragrance to men of Christ.
 - 4. Paul knew that his product did not rest on his feeble efforts but on the expectation that God was going to do something for him.
 - C. Many think that the victorious Christian life means that nothing will ever get to a person, but Paul knew that God was carrying out His purpose through his weaknesses.
 - 1. The victorious Christian life is a life of weakness.
 - 2. The believer goes from one battle to the next with little reprieve.
 - 3. Yet the triumph is occurring.
 - D. Paul claimed that he was not a peddler of the Word.
 - 1. Many today hock peripheral things from God's Word, but Paul was not like this.
 - 2. Others pose as biblical scholars dispensing theological garbage.
 - 3. Every Christian ought to help one another grow up and be mature Christians, instead.
 - E. Paul spoke with authority—in Christ.
