I. Introduction.

- A. Text: II Corinthians 4:16-5:5.
- B. Subject: life after death.
- C. Three categories of answers today:
 - 1. Nothing happens at all
 - 2. Anything can happen.
 - 3. The Christian answer: God conquered death in Jesus.
- II. There are reasons for hope as we have grace and as we look to the future.
 - A. Our inner nature is being renewed daily despite our outer nature fading.
 - 1. The inner man is the unique combination of soul and spirit that sets man apart from the animals.
 - 2. We are being inwardly prepared for something to come.
 - B. Our slight momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory.
 - 1. Compared to what is coming the affliction is light. (Romans 8)
 - 2. No trial is without significance.

C. There are important things that are unseen. God's word is the one reliable thing in an unreliable universe.

III. Our future hope.

- A. Paul is talking about the resurrected body. (I Corinthians 15)
- B. God had in mind that we would be a permanent dwelling place for Him.
- C. The resurrection body awaits the Christian—he will be more clothed and swallowed up by life.
- D. Explanations for the bodies in the grave.
 - 1. Some say we are disembodied temporarily.
 - 2. There is a soul sleep until the resurrected body is received.

3. God gives us an intermediate body until the resurrected body is received, but there is no Scripture to support this.

- 4. When we leave the present body, we leave time.
- E. The believer looks forward to the return of the Lord. (I Thessalonians 4)
