I. Introduction.

- A. Text: II Corinthians 10:7-18.
- B. Paul is dealing with someone trying to discredit his ministry.
 - 1. People began questioning Paul's Apostleship.
 - 2. They suggested he was a moral coward.

II. A clear picture of what a servant of Christ ought to be like—the credentials required to use spiritual weapons.

- A. We need to check the Scriptures on what is said.
- B. Marks of credible Christian ministry.
 - 1. One must belong to Christ and talk about that relationship.
 - 2. We must know by what authority men speak.
 - a. Look at the fruits of the ministry.

b. God calls men to freedom, but the man must be a servant in order to rule. (I Corinthians 2:8)

- 3. It is God who gives a ministry—we have no boast.
 - a. Christ has put you in a place where you are to exercise your ministry.
 - b. He has given you equipment and is giving you the resources you need.
- C. The marks of the ministry commended by God.
 - 1. It is not a self-commended ministry.
 - a. There is a difference between information and promotion.
 - b. Propagandizing is out of line.
 - 2. It is one where God opens doors and not vice versa.
 - 3. A genuine ministry always seeks to reach the unreached.

4. Boasting is to be in what the Lord has done—not what man has done. (I Corinthians 15:10)

a. It is what God does through us that counts.

b. The true evaluation of a ministry is to look back and thank God for what He did.
