I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Colossians 2:8-15.
- B. This passage deals with the terrible problem of being deceived.
- II. The Colossians are in danger of being held as a hostage to deceit.
 - A. The weapon that is useful to bring this about is philosophy, which is wisdom.
 - B. They are hollow and deceptive philosophies.
 - C. Three things to guard against hollow philosophies.
 - 1. They arise out of the thinking of men--tradition.
 - 2. They establish themselves as respectable.
 - 3. They rest on the basic principles of this world.

III. Paul's answer.

- A. Paul does not react negatively.
- B. Paul reminds the Colossians of what they already know.
 - 1. All the fullness of God dwells in Christ, and believers have Him—everything they need.
 - 2. We have been circumcised in Christ.
 - a. This is a matter of the heart where we were exposed and our sinful nature was put off.
 - b. The true Christian has a completely new basis of life.
 - 3. Sin has been dealt with in our relationship with God, and we only need to acknowledge it to benefit from it.
 - 4. We are freed from demonic powers by the cross.
