- II. Jesus accomplishes the forgiveness of sins.
 - A. We have been redeemed, or liberated.
 - 1. This pictures being bought from a slave market.
 - 2. In our natural condition, we are useless—everything we contribute to in this state will ultimately disappear.
 - 3. Achievement is not fulfillment. Jesus brings fulfillment.
 - 4. To be liberated means to be brought to fulfillment.
 - B. Our trespasses or sins are set aside.
 - 1. Forgiveness only comes through God.
 - 2. Jesus had to take our place to free us from our guilt.
 - 3. There is something deep within the human conscience that tells us that we are guilty.
 - 4. The gospel acknowledges our blame appropriately, but it also argues that the price has been fully paid through Jesus' sacrifice.
 - C. The gospel is the riches of His grace, which God lavished upon us.
 - 1. When you lavish something upon someone, you heap it upon him more and more.
 - 2. God's grace must be applied again and again.
 - 3. The believer daily needs forgiveness, and the believer daily has it.
 - 4. The believer has acceptance before God.
 - 5. True belief does not exploit God's grace.
