Turned on by Prayer

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- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Ephesians 1:15-18.
 - B. Paul turns to discuss prayer and the Scripture regarding maturing believers.
- II. The reason why the Apostle prayed.
 - A. Love convinced the saints that their faith was true.
 - B. If faith has not resulted in someone becoming a loving person, it is not true faith. Faith is revealed by the concerns that it awakens for the needy.
 - C. The knowledge of doctrine is never enough—if truth has not reached the heart, it is worthless.
- III. Whom Paul prays to: the God of our Lord Jesus, the God of glory.
 - A. Paul prays to the God of Jesus because this is how Jesus modeled prayer.
 - B. The God of glory means the God who produces glory. When one prays to God for understanding, one asks Him to make the truth glorious.
- IV. For what Paul prays.
 - A. He prays for a spirit of revelation.
 - B. They already have the Holy Spirit, but Paul prays for a special ministry of the Holy Spirit. (James 4:2)
 - C. Truth finally leads to an understanding of the person of God. Our goal is to know God—this is eternal life. (John 17)
- V. The instrument by which prayer occurs: the opening of the eyes of the heart.
 - A. He prays that the believer might know the hope of his calling, the riches of his present inheritance among the saints, and the exceeding greatness of God's power.
 - B. The believer will come to know these things as the eyes of the heart are enlightened.
 - C. The whole man must respond to the truth of God. (Luke 24)
- VI. Pray for others that their hearts might be changed by the truth around them.
