 - 2. Man is also dead because of the sin in which he chooses to partake.
 - C. Three forces at work.
 - 1. The age that we live pressures man to conform.
 - 2. The devil is at work to increase disobedience.
 - 3. The flesh.
 - a. Desire is not always wrong.
 - b. When our desires become drives, they become wrong.
 - c. No one can escape these overwhelming desires leaving mankind hopeless without intervention.
 - D. Mankind is subject to the wrath of God. Wrath is designed to make a person realize he is violating a principle of his own nature.
