- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Ephesians 4:22-24.
 - B. There is far more to Christianity than just one's final destiny.
 - C. Christianity is intended to change man to live differently now.
- II. The place to begin in the Christian life is a change of thought.
 - A. The mind must be changed.
 - B. The thinking of the world in general is ignorance.
 - C. Paul is not challenging the world's logic but its underlying premises.
- III. The principle: the old nature must be put off, and the new nature must be put on.
 - A. The realities in Jesus Christ become true through this process.
 - B. There is recognition of the pull of the old life to the Christian.
 - 1. Paul's appeal is to deny the underlying assumptions of the old life—all outlooks and attitudes.
 - 2. The former life results in misery and unhappiness.
 - 3. We recognize these attitudes because they are deceitful lusts—any urge or basic drive.
 - 4. These basic urges promise much, but they never satisfy.
 - 5. There is the urge to use others for our own advantage, to be impatient, to be defensive, etc.
 - C. The old things are to be put off because these things are part of an old man.
 - 1. In the cross of Christ, Jesus judged the old life. (II Corinthians 5:21)
 - 2. All the urges from the self-life do nothing for us.
 - 3. The first step is to recognize that these things are the old life.
 - D. The wonderful possibilities of the new man must be realized.
 - 1. The fundamental difference between a Christian and a non-Christian is that the Christian has been renewed.

2. The only change a non-Christian	can make is a change to	a different expression of the
same old nature.		

- 3. The old nature is no longer identified with the believer.
- 4. The new life is the life of Christ lived in the believer.
- 5. The righteous behavior we put on is true and genuine.
- 6. Holiness is to be put on that reflects wholeness.
- E. The old man has been asphyxiating—the believer has a choice to make every time he recognizes the deceitful urges from within.
- F. This is a process that absolutely works.
 - 1. There is no trying—any failure is an excuse.
 - 2. It is entirely dependent on Christ within.
