 - 1. Learn to control your own body. This means you learn to control the slavery of lust.
 - 2. Learn to respect the rights of others. (Deuteronomy 31)
 - a. Violating God' standard results in God's judgment.
 - b. There is the breakup of the family and the despair of the soul.
