- B. The first step in Christian vitality is to do what one says.
- II. What public worship ought to gather around.
 - A. Prayer. Public prayer was to take priority for fellow Christians and those around.
 - 1. It focuses a person on God immediately, which brings reality and vitality to a service.
 - 2. It puts one's own humanity into perspective.

3. We are not to forsake meeting together--often the problems of our lives are solved by coming to church. (Psalm 73)

 - a. Supplications.
 - b. Prayers, which God alone can meet.
 - c. Intercessions.
- 5. Paul includes thanksgivings as important parts of the service.
- 6. The objects of prayer.
 - a. All people.
 - b. Public officials.
 - c. All in high positions.
- 7. Results.
 - a. The peace of our community is related to our prayers.

c. Prayer fulfills the will of God. Prayer is God's way of opening up men for salvation. There is only one provision for salvation--Jesus Christ.

d. There is only one gospel and it brings a person in touch with reality.
