  - A. Young men were not to be seen as rivals but as brothers.
  - B. Older women were to be treated as mothers by the younger men.
  - C. Younger women were to be treated as sisters.
  - D. Love is not to be artificially stirred up.
- III. The problem of widows.
  - A. Qualifications of assistance.
    - 1. They were to be real widows without family to help them.
    - 2. The widow who was to be supported was to give themselves to a spiritual ministry.
    - 3. The widow was at least to be sixty years old, a one husband woman, and well attested in her good deeds.
  - B. This kind of a woman would commend herself to the Christian community in powerful ways.
  - C. Younger widows were not to be supported because they were too young and would want to have a family themselves.
    - 1. Paul did not want them to prove unfaithful to their first pledge.
    - 2. Neither did he want them to become idlers.
  - D. Married women were to assist those who were real widows.
