3. Avoid godless chatter because its talk will eat like gangrene.
4. If we lose the resurrection, we lose everything. (I Corinthians 15)
5. Error can rapidly spread through the congregation.
D. We are to remember God's firm foundation.
1. God's church is never going to be altered, attacked or diminished by heresies.
2. God knows who are His, and man can know whose are His when people depart from iniquity. (Numbers 16, I John 2)
