 - A. Text: I John 2:15-17.
 - B. We achieve maturity through various events and stages.
 - C. Subject: the supreme threat to fellowship and Christian maturity.
- II. What is dangerous about the world.
 - A. The world itself.
 - 1. This is not referring to physical nature.
 - 2. This is not referring to the world of people either. (John 3:16)
 - 3. This refers to a religious world that hated Christ because He continually challenged its philosophy.
 - a. It is concerned only with the honor that comes from man.
 - b. It is centered only in this life.
 - B. The things of the world.
 - 1. The lust of the flesh. This refers to the sinful tendencies of humanity.
 - 2. The lust of the eyes.
 - a. This is a desire for comfort and pleasure.
 - b. There are certain things that we are not to enter into because they are not good for us.
 - 3. The pride of life. This is the desire to awaken envy or adulation in others.
 - 4. We are not to love these things.
 - C. Since love for God and love for the world is mutually exclusive, we cannot love both.
 - 1. No man can serve two masters—choosing the world excludes the love of God completely.
 - 2. He who chooses God abides forever.
