When the Spirit Says No Ray Stedman

I. Introduction.

- A. Text: I John 3:9.
- B. Triumphalists read this verse and suggest that it is possible to come to the place where a real Christian cannot sin.

II. Views on this verse.

- A. The triumphal view. This view holds that there comes a time when a Christian cannot sin.
- B. The Catholic view. This view holds that there are certain sins a believer will never commit (mortal sins), but believers in the Bible commit these.
- C. Another view holds that a Christian will not commit willful sin, but David deliberately and willfully murdered and committed adultery.
- D. Some argue that sin is not considered sin if it is done by a believer.
- E. Others say that John is describing the ideal condition and not the true one.
- F. The two-nature view. This view holds that John is contrasting the Adamic nature and the new nature the believer receives from God.
 - 1. The problem with this view is that the whole person is involved in the act of sin.
 - 2. The believer struggles with the flesh. (Romans 7)
- G. The final view is that the believer cannot struggle habitually with sin without ultimately forsaking it.
 - 1. John is declaring that sin is no longer true to the believer's nature.
 - 2. The one born of God cannot persist in sin because it is contrary to him.
- III. There comes a time when God asks us to remove things from our lives.
 - A. God will complete the good work of maturation in the believer. (Romans 8:29)
 - B. The flesh and the Spirit within are opposed to each other. (Galatians 5)
- IV. The reason for this condition is the believer has been radically changed.
 - A. We are joined to Christ by regeneration.
 - B. However, our attitude may not be right in that.

- C. The Spirit of God is trying to teach us to rest in that change within us.
- D. God forces us into circumstances, which we must rely upon the Spirit.
 - 1. Trust makes us abide--in desperate moments we find ourselves abiding in Christ.
 - 2. Breaking from habitual sin is proof of the new life in Jesus Christ.
