 - C. Theme: Jabez was a man who believed in prayer.
- II. There is something wrong in the life of Jabez.
 - A. The clue is that his brothers were dishonorable—his family had a bad reputation, and he was the exception.
 - B. Jabez's mother named him "pain." The mother saw nothing ahead but hopelessness.
 - C. No father is mentioned.
 - D. Jabez's prayer for a larger border is indicative of poverty.
 - E. Jabez prays that God would keep him from the evil in him to keep him from "pain."
 - F. This is a picture of a person who has all the cards stacked against him.
- III. Jabez learned that there was a God and He answered prayer.
 - A. Jabez is not being selfish in his prayer because he is praying for something God wanted him to have.
 - B. Asking for a blessing is a request to be close to God.
 - 1. Jabez understood that the key to life is to be loved, understood and appreciated.
 - 2. Jabez above all else requests for a consciousness that he belongs to God and God to him.
 - C. Jabez's request for larger borders is a request for opportunity.
 - D. Jabez's request for God's hand is for a guide in the unexpected future.
 - E. Jabez's request to be kept from the evil is recognition of the evil within him.
- IV. God granted what Jabez asked.
 - A. Everything was restored to Jabez, probably over time.
 - B. Answers to prayers often come in quiet, subtle ways.
