- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Habakkuk 1:1-3:19.
 - B. Many of us feel helpless when we encounter some disaster that we cannot control.
 - C. Habakkuk protests at what seems to be the indifference of God.
- II. God's response: I am raising up the Chaldeans.
 - A. The answer was unexpected—one of the most difficult problems we face is when God is apparently inactive. The Chaldeans were being raised to judge the Jews.
 - B. Habakkuk is amazed at God's inconsistency—how could God use a less righteous country to punish a righteous country?
 - 1. We cannot choose the scene of our own martyrdom.
 - 2. God is showing Habakkuk that the problem is much worse than he thought.
- III. Habakkuk's response: he waits for God to give him understanding.
 - A. The problem is not God in our lack of understanding—it is us.
 - B. We are to ask, seek and know to see what God is going to do.
 - C. God answers us in His word, to our spirits and in our circumstances.
- IV. God's response: wait.
 - A. One of the hardest things to gain is patience—we must often wait upon God.
 - B. Delays are not denials.
 - C. The righteous shall live by faith. (Habakkuk 2:4)
 - 1. This is one of the most important verses in the Bible. (Romans, Galatians, Hebrews)
 - 2. We are made right by what we believe.
 - 3. The soul that is puffed up will fail.
- V. Habakkuk's response of faith.
 - A. Habakkuk's cry resembles Jesus' cry in Gethsemane: free me from this trouble, but in the end let Your will be done over mine.
