I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Deuteronomy 6:5-9.
- B. Subject: teaching in the home.

C. The forces at work in the home can be hurtful as well as helpful.

II. What needs to be taught is to love God.

A. Nothing can happen through us that have not happened to us. Parents must be living examples.

B. Parents must teach the love of God diligently to their children within their homes in relation to life.

III. What is to be done.

A. The love of God must be talked about, not preached or taught directly.

1. The Sunday school should not be the primary place for teaching, nor should it be transferred into the home.

2. God must be recognized everywhere in life contrary to the world.

- B. The kingdom of God is to be sought primarily.
- C. Follow a simple method of discovery and response—talk about God naturally.

IV. Where and when it is to be done.

- A. Do it at a mealtime.
 - 1. The parent must be the initiator.
 - 2. There needs to be honesty and vulnerability.

3. God is the "Grand Perhaps" appearing at all sorts of moments—we are always to look for teachable moments.

- 4. Do not moralize—let it be genuine.
- 5. Ask thought provoking questions.

B. Family worship ought to grow out of a universal exposure to the nature and knowledge of God.

C. Encouragement and truth is needed each morning, but a person must adapt to each circumstance.
