 - D. Jesus fully regards prophesy as that which will be fulfilled simply and literally.
- II. The people that Jesus forewarns.
 - A. Those that are in Judea.
 - B. Jews who live in Judea as made clear by "the Sabbath."
 - C. Believing Jews as made clear by "the elect."
 - D. They are not Christians because in the church Jews are not distinguished and Christians are not bound to the law.
 - E. This takes place before the great tribulation. (John 5:28)
 - 1. The archangel will stand up to signify renewal in Israel. (Daniel 12:1)
 - 2. Before the tribulation breaks forth the 144,000 from the tribe of Israel are seen with Jesus. (Revelation 7:2-3)
 - 3. The 144,000 are great witnesses at work while the man at lawlessness is at work. (Revelation 7:9)
 - 4. This body is somewhat ineffective because their witness is only individual—they do not act as restraints to those around them.

 - A. Man will come to the place where he no longer believes he needs a God, and the dark forces will be released.
 - B. What we can take away.

- 2. The world is moving on schedule. (John 14)
- 3. God's dealings with Israel are ever a picture of His dealings with us. The result of our unbelief is wandering and death, but God knows how to break through unbelief.
